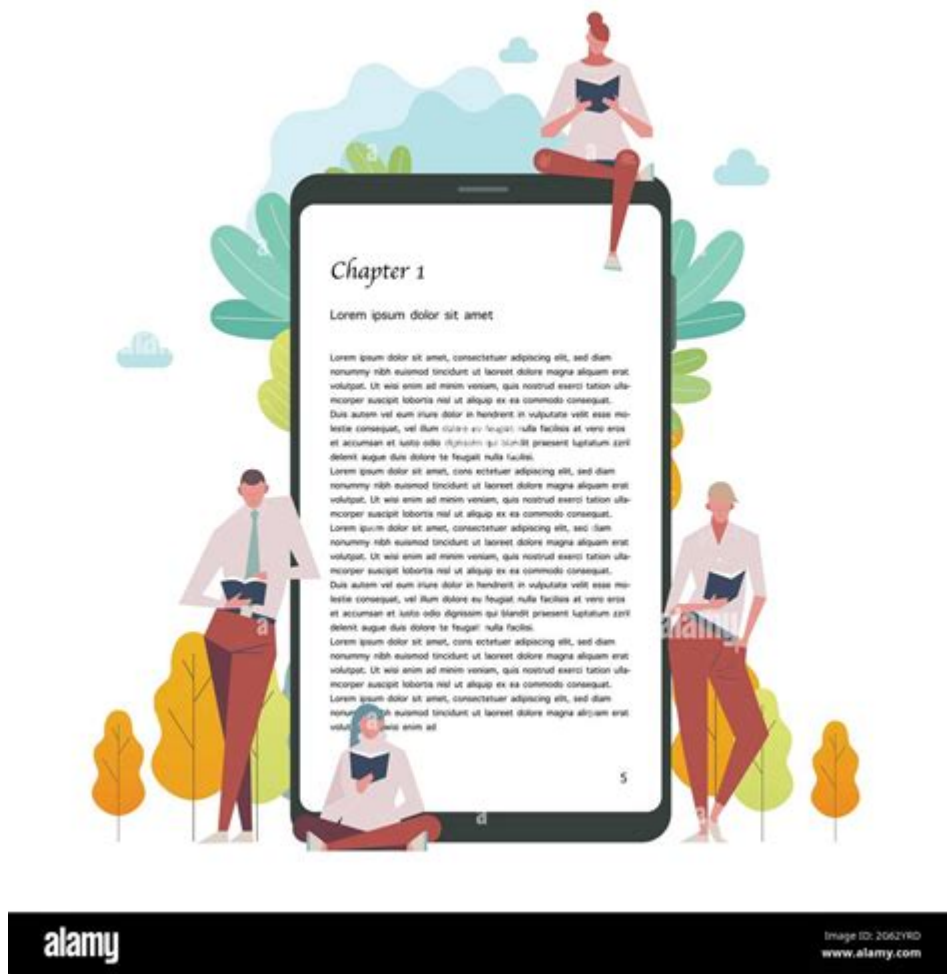
To bypass the predictable, you'll need to employ a few tactical reading strategies.

## **Deep and Unconventional Histories**

Does the world have a rich, layered history that feels distinct, not just a rehashing of human historical events with fantasy names? Look for ancient civilizations with unique downfalls, forgotten technologies,

or mythologies that aren't merely retellings of established lore.



## **Red Flags to Be Wary Of**

Conversely, certain elements often signal a lack of originality in world-building. Generic fantasy races (elves, dwarves, orcs with no unique twist), magic systems that are just thinly veiled elemental powers, “chosen one” prophecies without a unique context, or medieval European settings without any significant deviation are common indicators that the world-building might lean heavily on established tropes.
