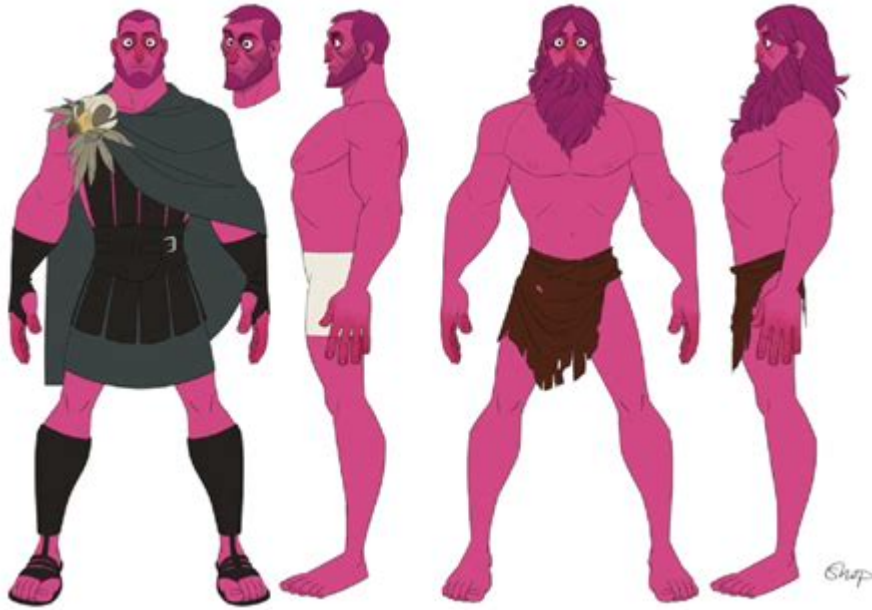
## The Comedic Arc: Growth Through Gaffes
