The Power of the Unseen and the Implied Threat

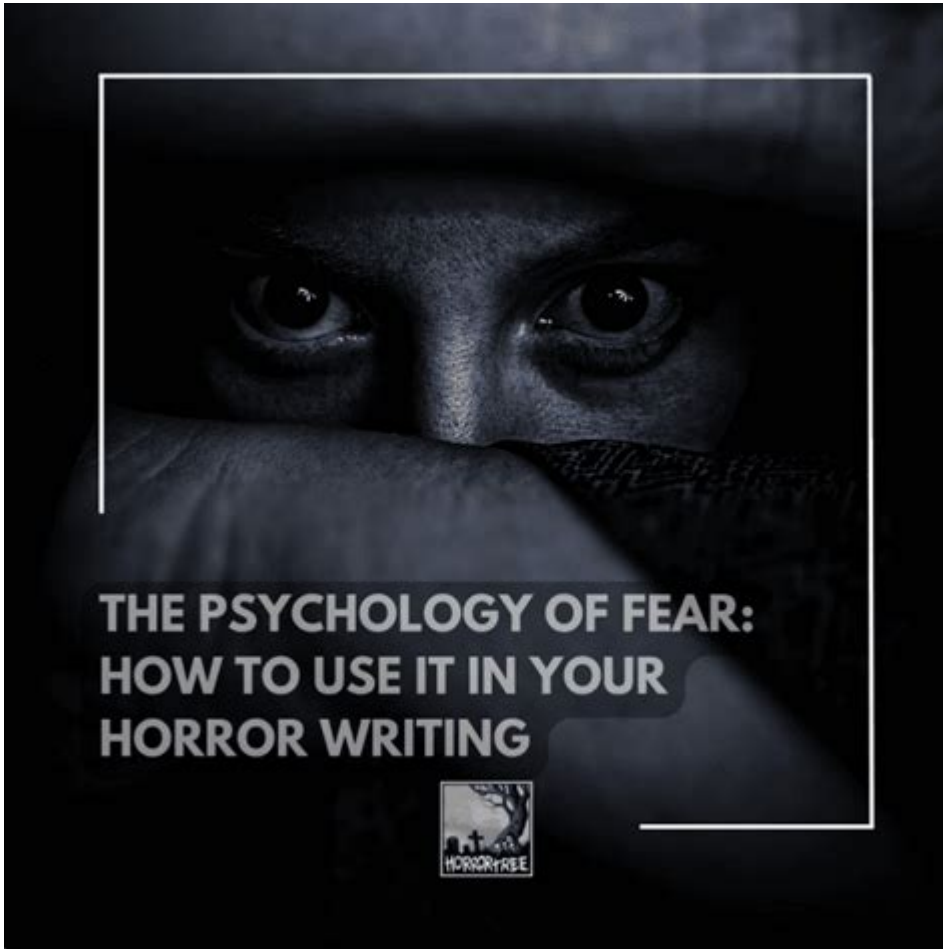
