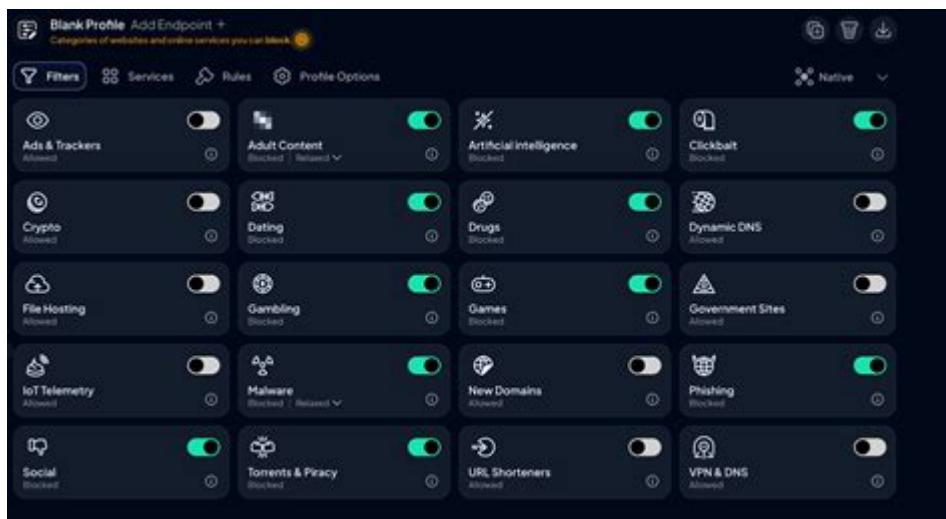

Exploring New Authors Through Specific Avenues

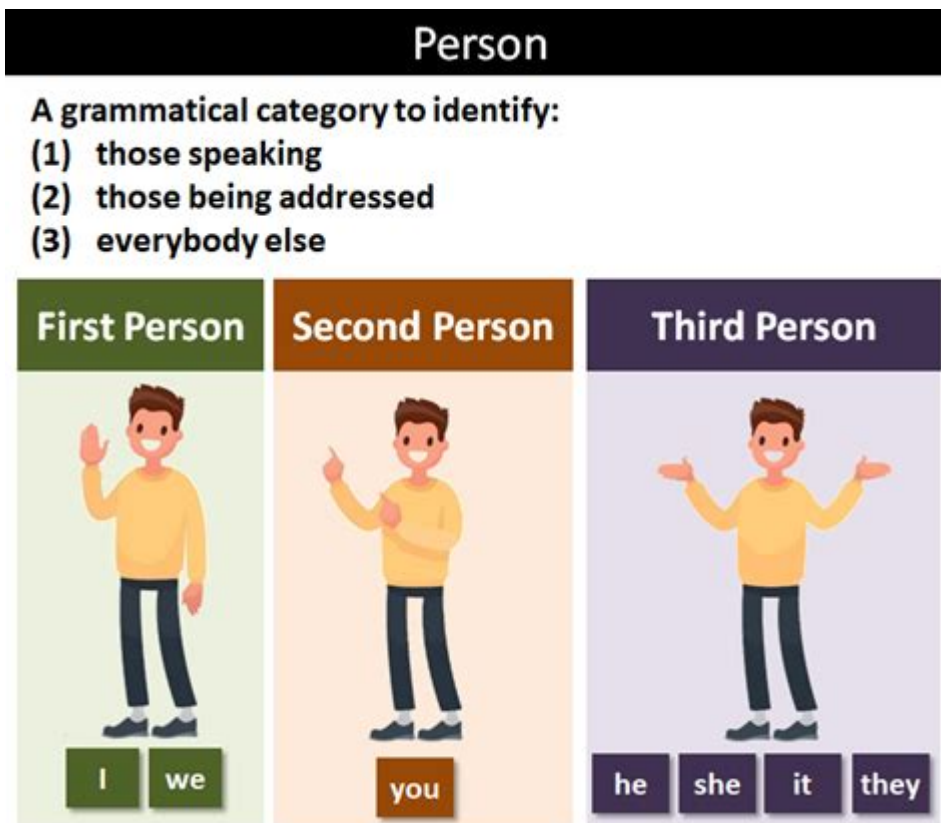
Indie Author Communities

MANY

Many is used with countable nouns. It is mainly used in questions, affirmative sentences and negations.

Examples

- I don't have **many** friend.
- There are too **many** disadvantages in this business.
- How **many** children do you have?
- Are there **many** poor people in France?

MUCH

Much is used with uncountable nouns. It is mainly used in negative and interrogative clauses.

Examples

- How **much** money have you got?
- We didn't spend **much** money.
- There isn't **much** data to download.
- I'm sorry but I don't have **much** time.
