## Spotting Anachronisms and Inconsistencies

Keep an eye out for elements that feel out of place for the declared historical period:

- **Technology and Objects:** Are technologies, inventions, or everyday items mentioned that didn't exist then? (e.g., a character in 15th-century England drinking coffee, which arrived much later).
- **Social Norms and Beliefs:** Do characters act, think, and interact in ways that align with the societal structures and common beliefs of the time? Anachronistic attitudes are a common pitfall.
- **Geographical Accuracy:** Are locations described realistically for the period? Roads, town sizes, and political boundaries can change dramatically over centuries.

## Cross-Referencing Key Details

If the story mentions specific historical events, dates, or minor historical figures, do a quick fact-check:

- **Reliable Online Sources:** Start with reputable encyclopedias (e.g., Britannica), academic history websites, or well-regarded historical societies. Wikipedia can be a good starting point for names and dates, but always cross-reference with more authoritative sources.
- **Key Events/Dates:** Are the major historical events depicted accurately in terms of sequence and general outcome?

- **Famous Figures:** If a real historical figure appears, do their actions and personality in the novel align with what is generally known about them?
