the world, often leading to unexpected and amusing situations within the adventure.

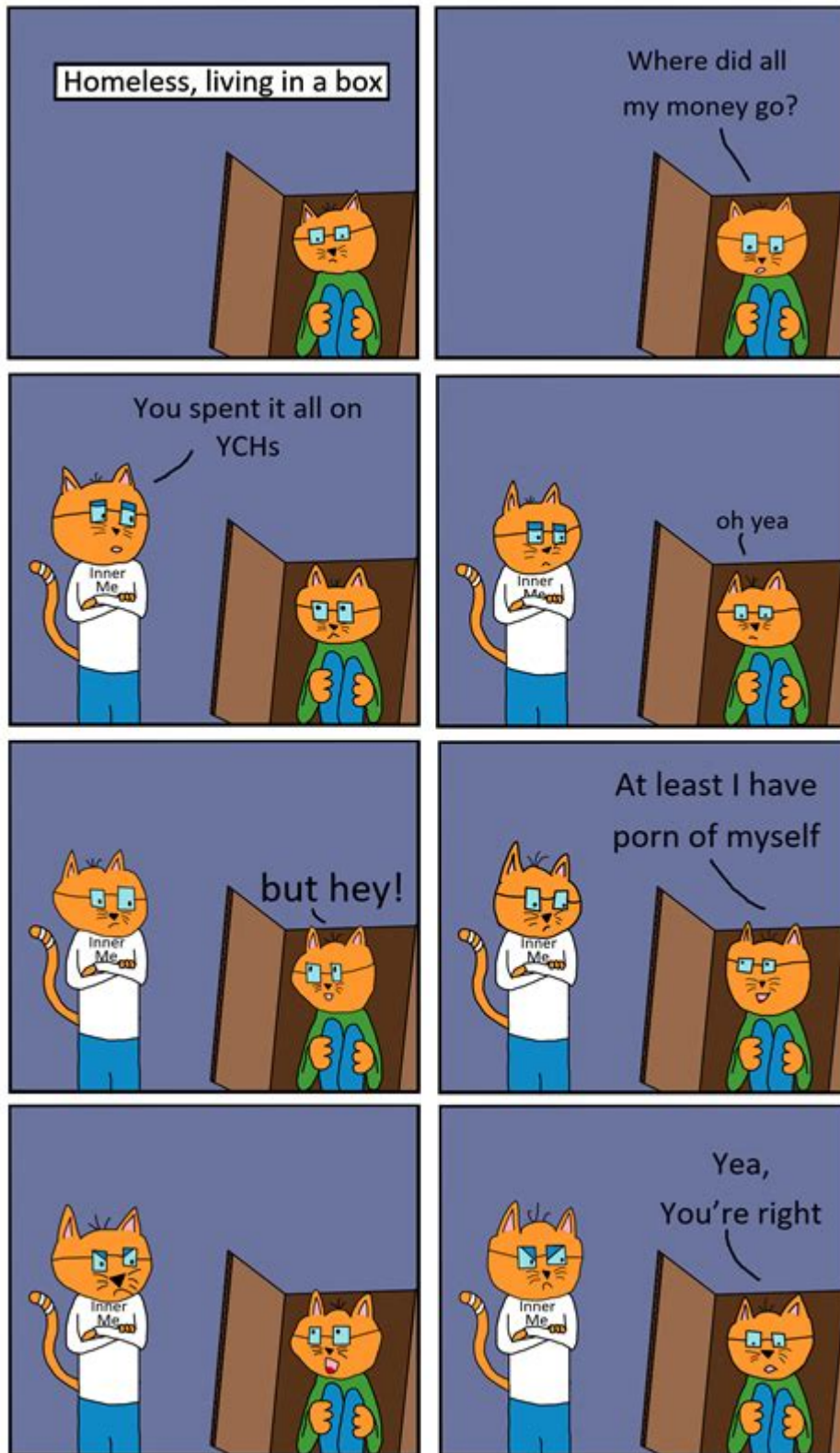
Situational Comedy Born from Character
