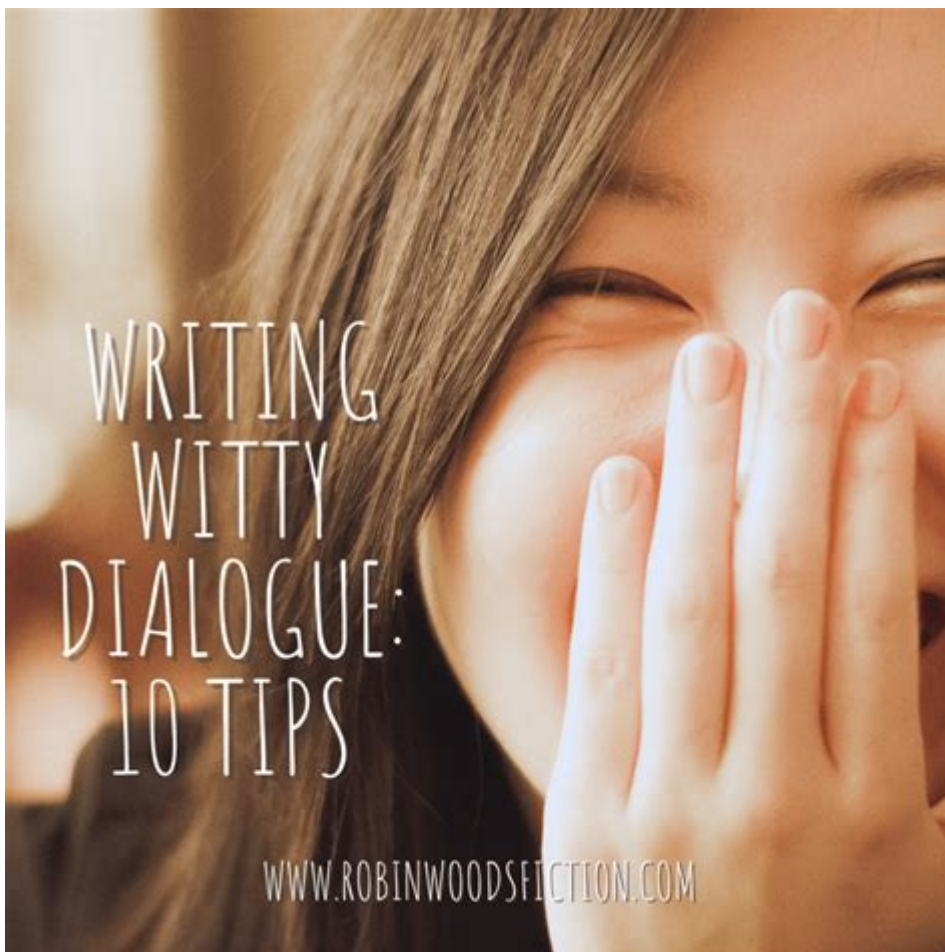


Situational Comedy and Plot Integration
