Western	Personal Liberty and Subjugation	The Showdown (a.k.a. Hero at the Mercy of the Villain)	...the hero uses their unique talents to battle or outwit the villain.
Worldview	Naivete and Maturity	The New Worldview in Action	...the protagonist chooses to act in a way that demonstrates their new, more nuanced understanding of the world or refuses to change.


Strategic Use of Lulls and Foreshadowing
