

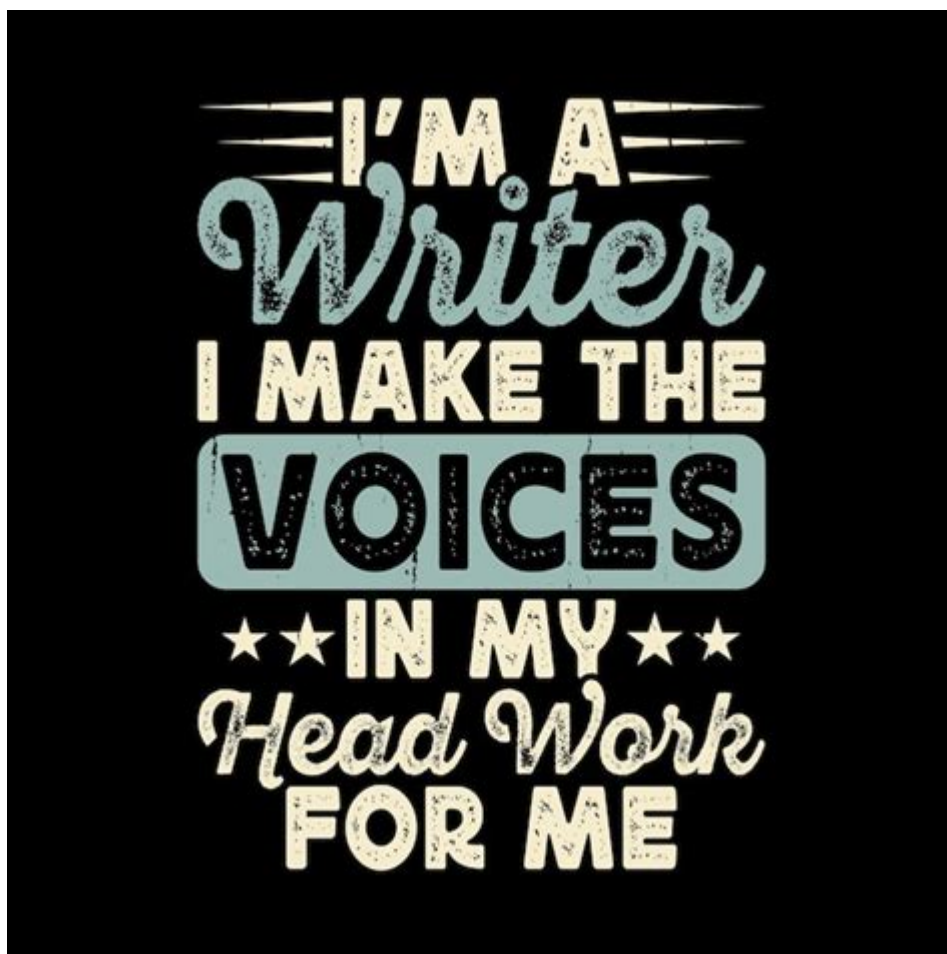
How to avoid predictable humor & keep comedic novels genuinely fresh for readers?
