with caution.

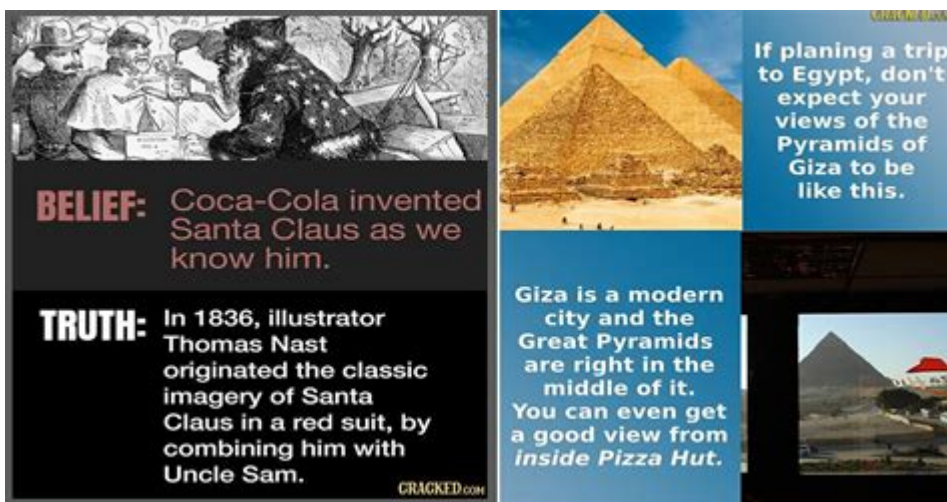
Red Flags to Watch Out For

Overly Modern Language or Sensibilities

While some colloquialisms are inevitable, consistently modern speech patterns or characters exhibiting anachronistic attitudes (e.g., 21st-century feminism in a medieval setting without narrative context) can pull you out of the story and signal a lack of authenticity.

Lack of Specific Historical Detail

If the description of the setting is vague, generic, or could apply to multiple historical periods, it might lack the granular detail necessary for true historical immersion.
