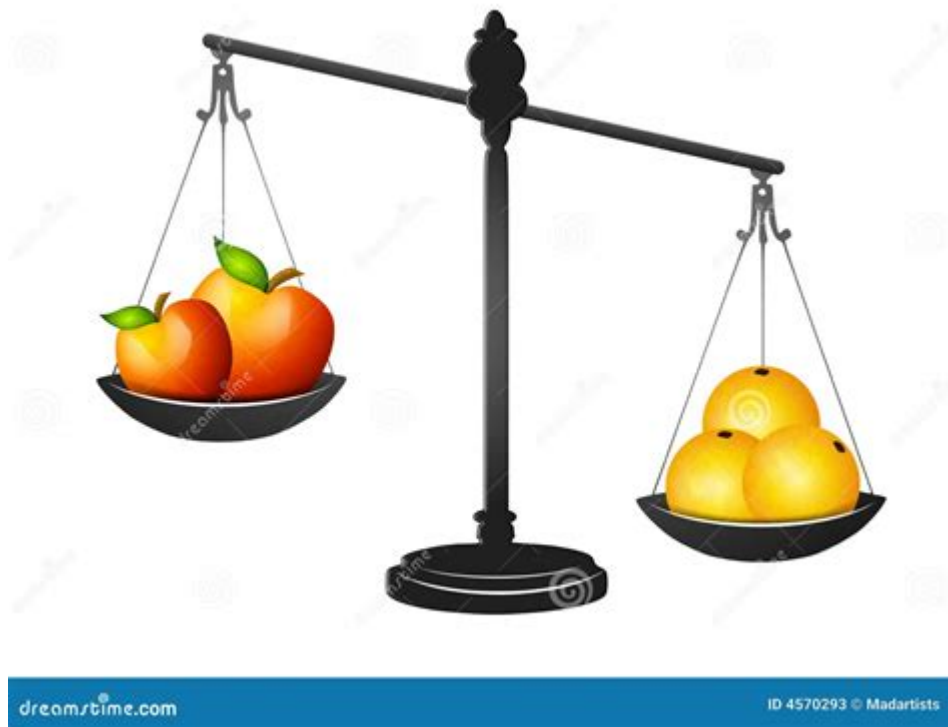


Key Distinguishing Factors
