
Go Beyond the "Popular" Lists

Explore Niche Communities and Forums

Online communities, subreddits (like r/romancebooks or r/fantasyromance), Discord servers, and Goodreads groups dedicated to specific romance subgenres or independent authors are goldmines. Readers in these communities are often passionate about discovering and sharing unique finds. Ask for recommendations for "romances with unusual tropes" or "stories that subvert expectations."
