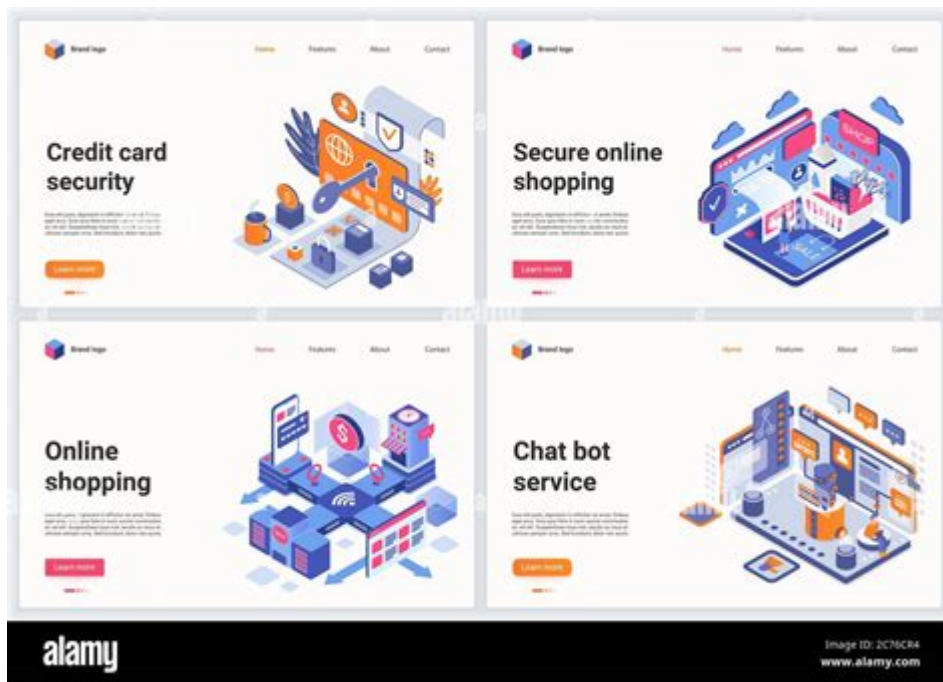
1. Public Domain Treasures
