The Unwitting Comedian

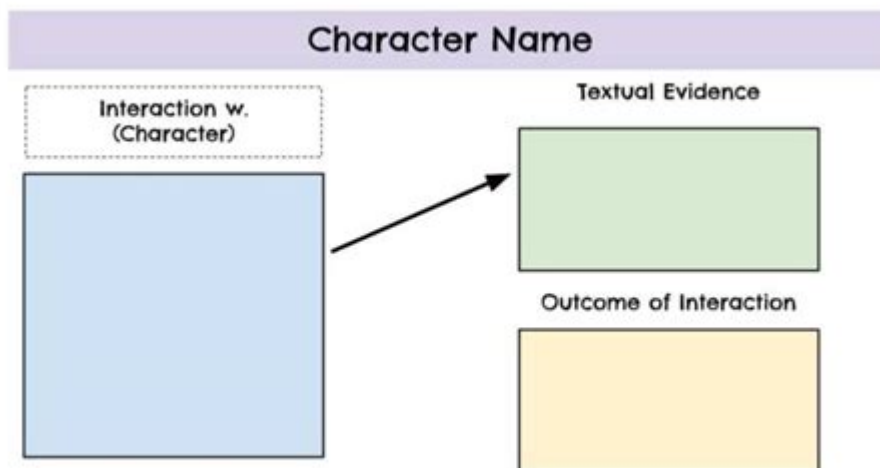

While flaws can be dramatic, they can also be funny. A character's chronic clumsiness, an obsession with mundane details amidst chaos, or an endearing lack of common sense can provide consistent, character-driven humor without resorting to forced jokes.

Maintaining Balance and Preserving Stakes

The cardinal rule of comic relief in adventure is that it should never undermine the stakes or the reader's emotional investment. Humor works best as a contrast, making the serious moments even more impactful.

Time your comedic beats carefully. Often, humor is most effective after a peak of tension, allowing the reader to decompress.
