

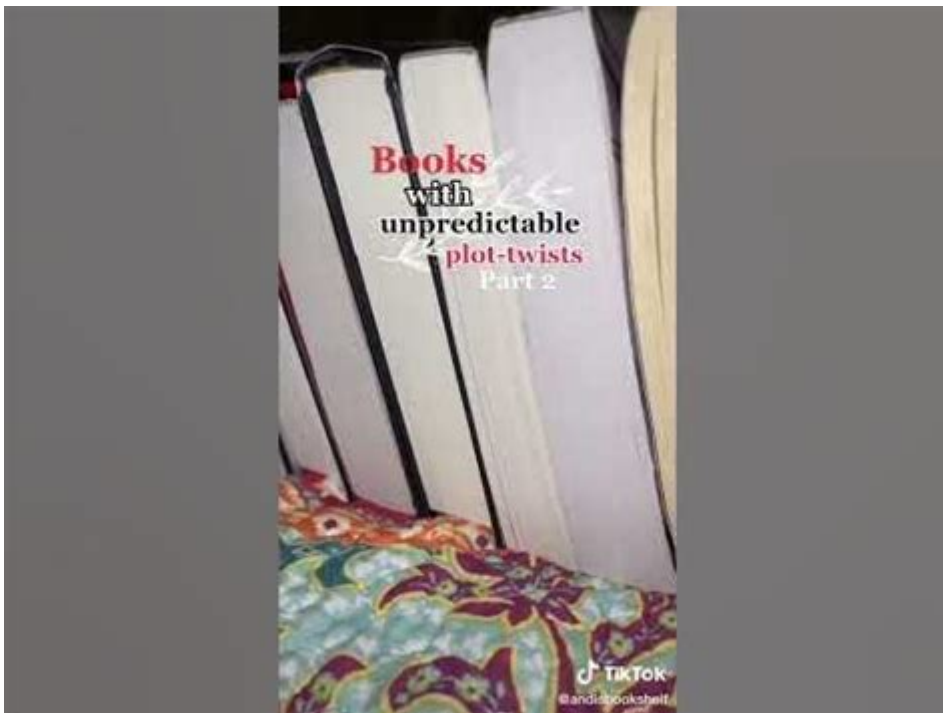

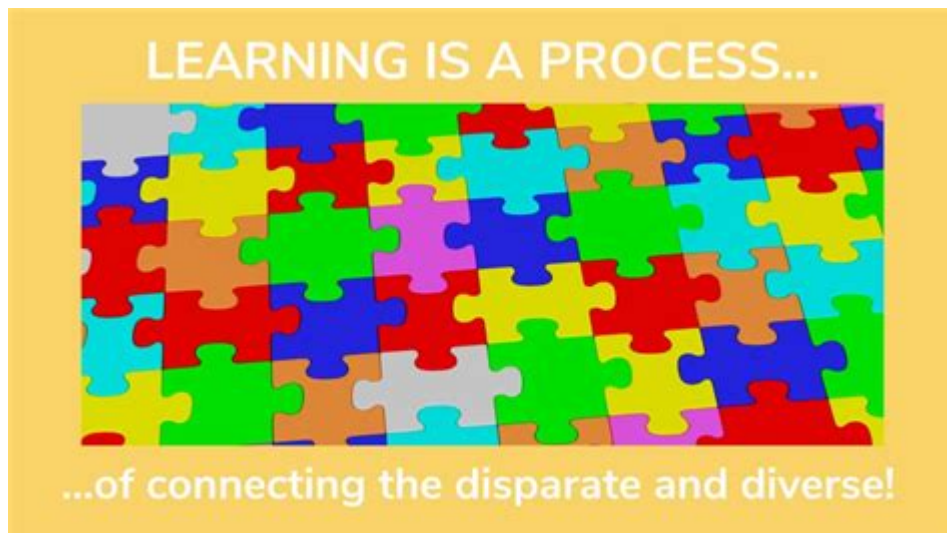
SETTINGS/LOCATIONS
