Pacing, Timing, and the Art of the Setup

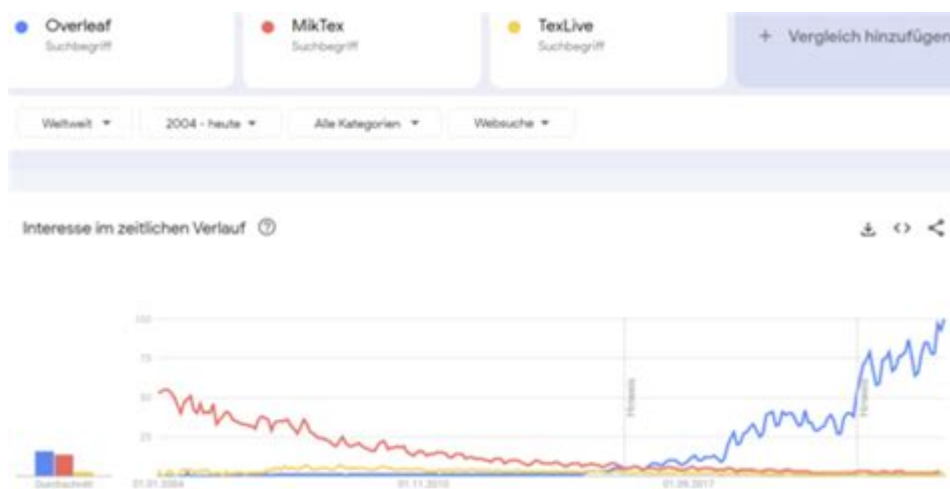

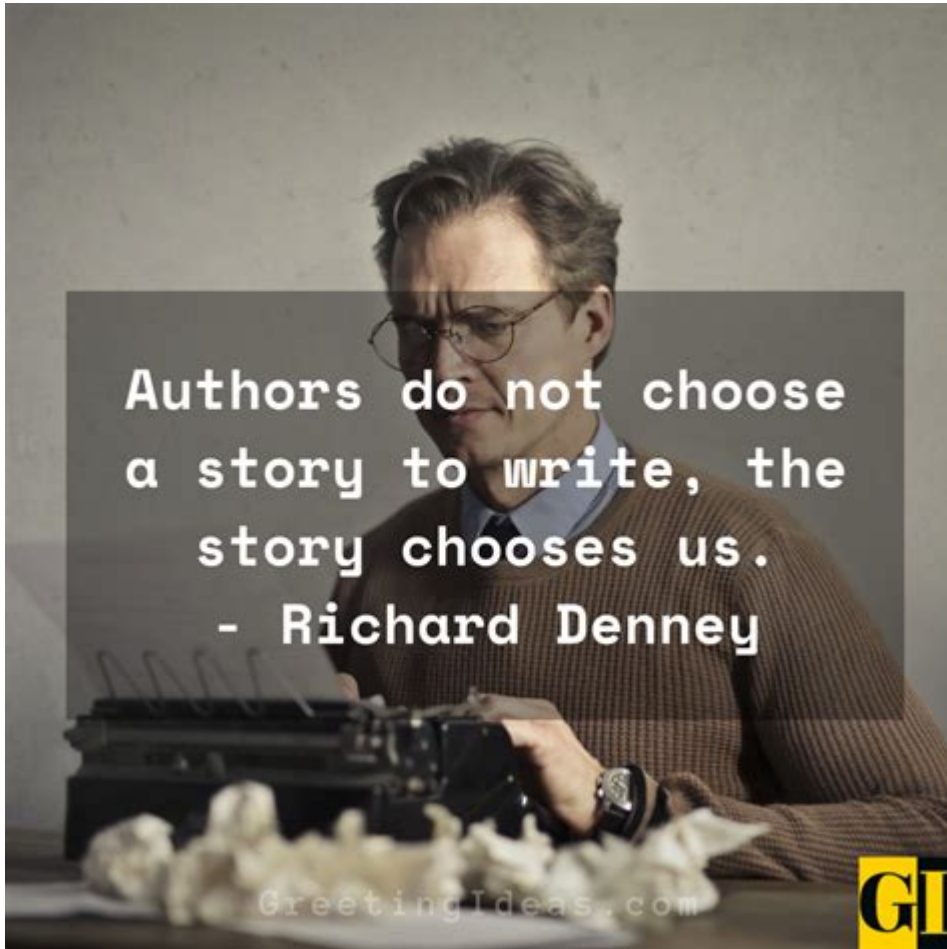
