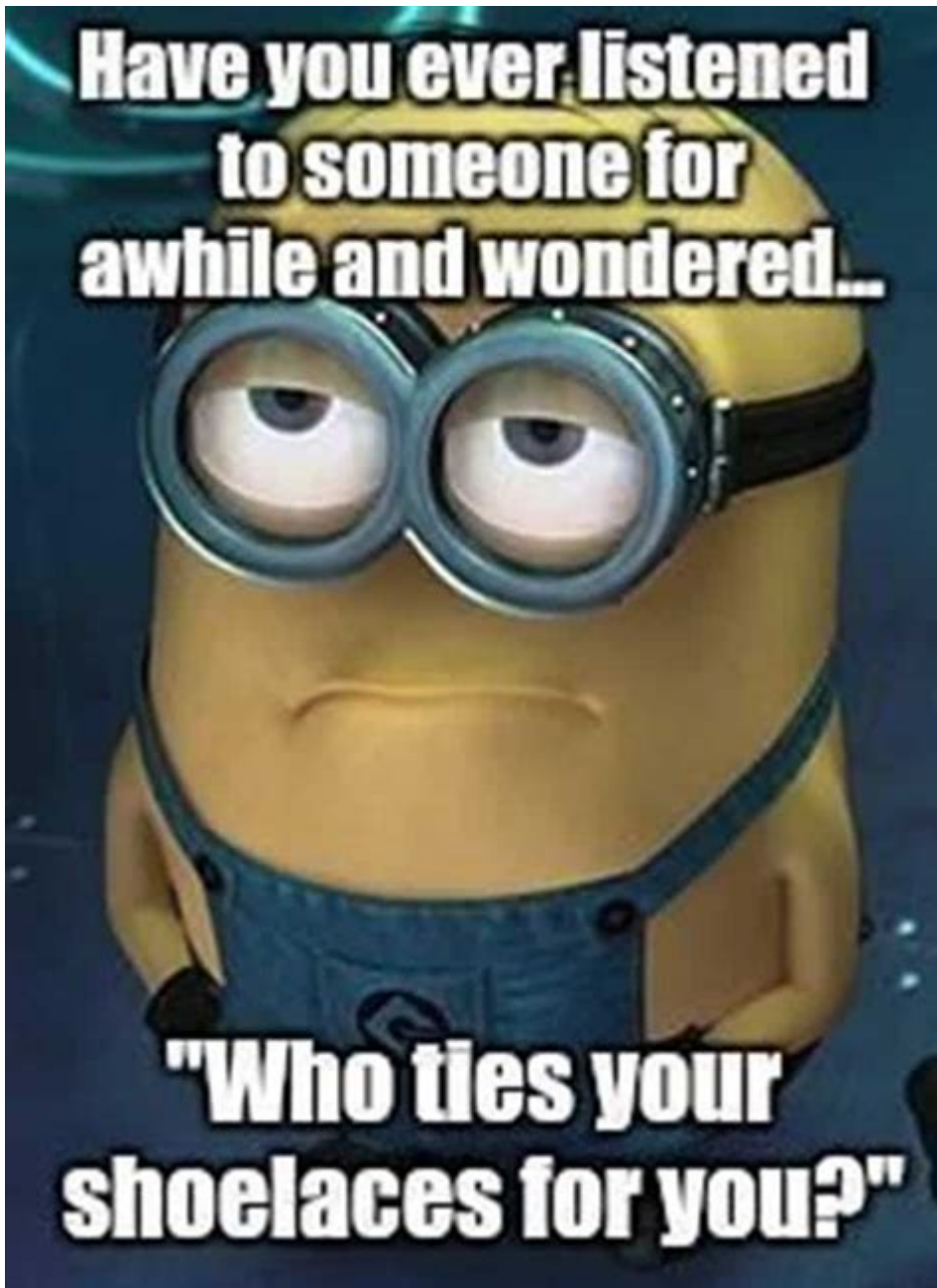

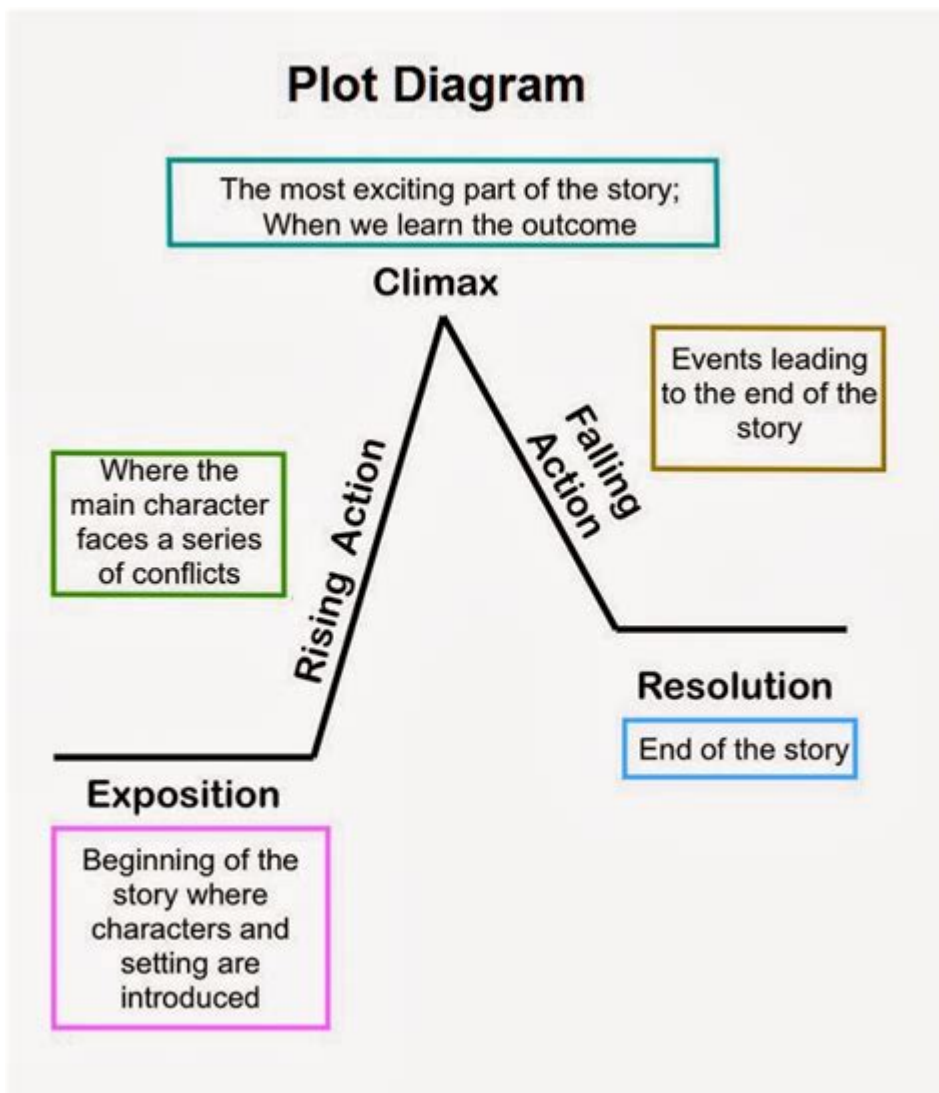

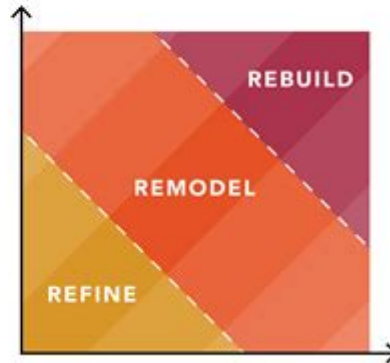
comedy feels effortless, but it's often the result of painstaking craft.
