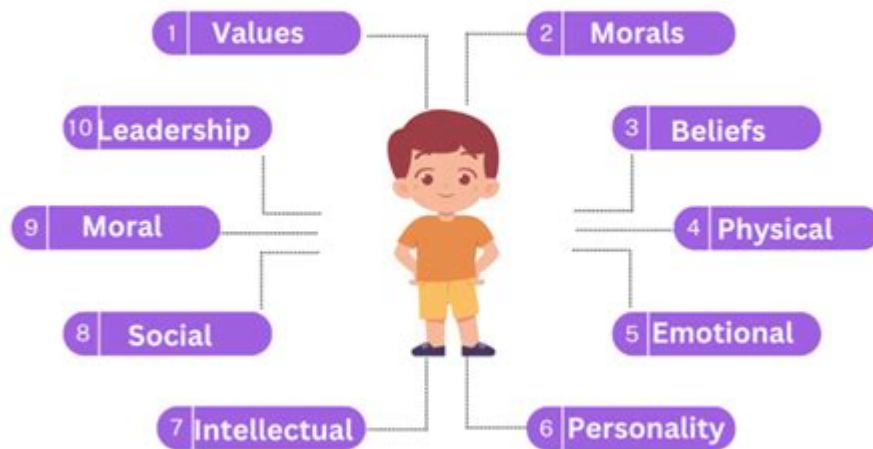
into a journey through fantastical architectures and profound ideas about memory, desire, and urban existence.
