Specialized SF Hubs: Baen & Tor



- **Author Reputation:** Is the author well-known, even if their current work isn't free? Public domain works by classic authors often guarantee a certain level of quality.
- **Publication Date:** While classics are great, be aware that very recent, obscure free titles might sometimes be of lower quality, especially from self-published authors trying to gain traction.
