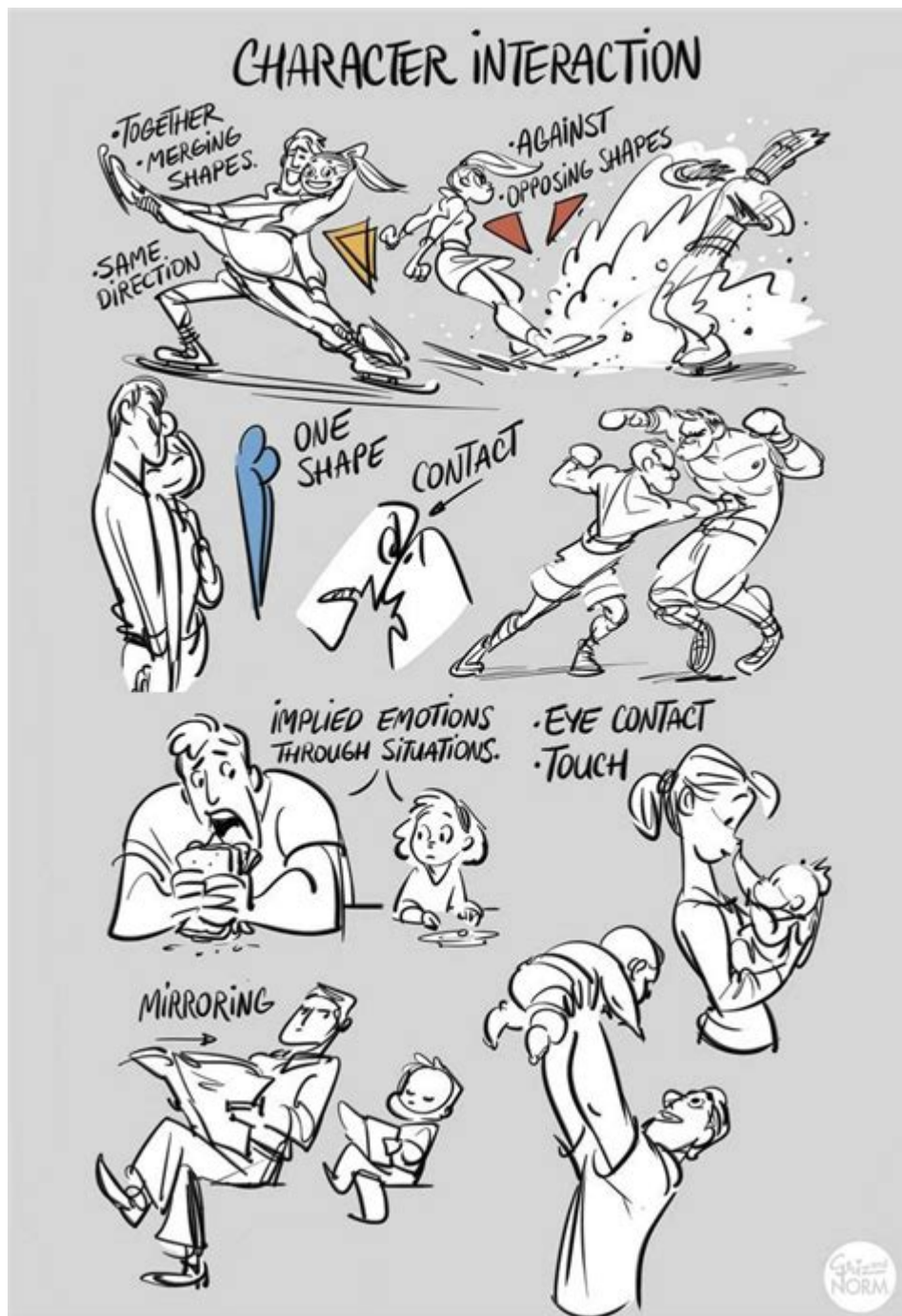
Crafting Comedic Characters with Purpose
