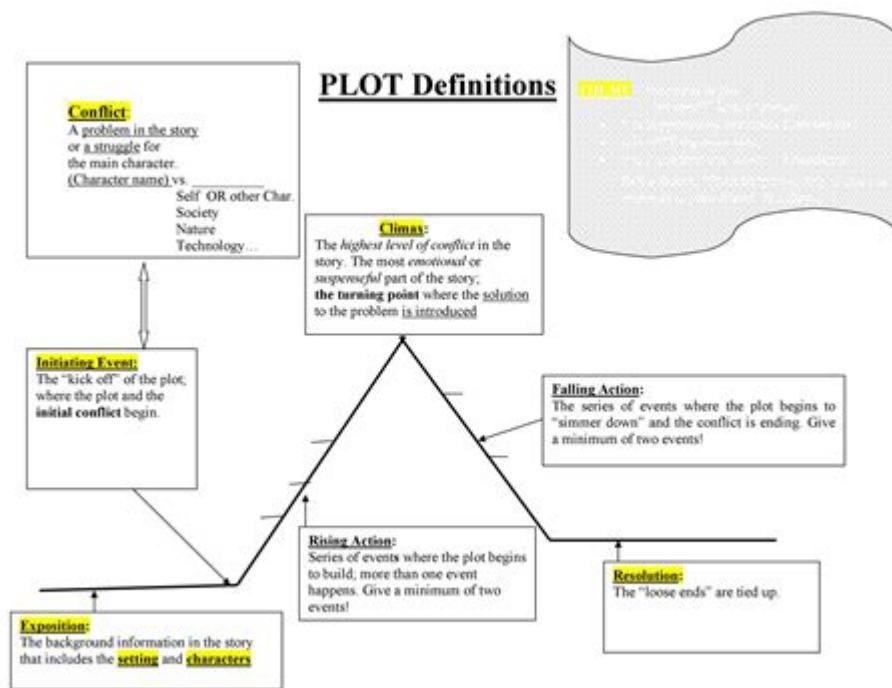

How to make Dialogue more Interesting:

Don't include everything everyone says

Instead, focus on the dialogue that moves the story forward or reveals important character traits. You can also use summary to convey the content of a conversation without including all the details.

Before:
"Hey, how was your day?"
"It was fine, thanks for asking."
"Anything interesting happen?"
"Not really, just the usual stuff."

After:
"Hey, how was your day?" she asked.
"Fine," he replied, shrugging.
"Anything interesting happen?"
She waited for a beat before he shook his head. "Just the usual stuff, I guess."

In this example, the second version focuses on the most important parts of the conversation, cutting out some of the small talk and summarizing the rest. This makes the conversation more efficient and engaging for the reader.
