- **Cyberpunk:** Dystopian futures with high tech and low life, focusing on artificial intelligence, corporate control, and rebels (e.g., works inspired by William Gibson).
- **Hard Sci-Fi:** Grounded in scientific accuracy and plausible technology, often exploring the implications of real-world physics and engineering (e.g., early works of Arthur C. Clarke).

- **Dystopian:** Societies where everything has gone wrong, exploring political, social, and technological cautionary tales (e.g., “1984” or “Brave New World” are often available in public domain in some regions).
- **Time Travel:** Paradoxes, alternate histories, and journeys through different eras.
- **Alien Contact/Invasion:** First encounters, conflicts, or collaborations with extraterrestrial life.
