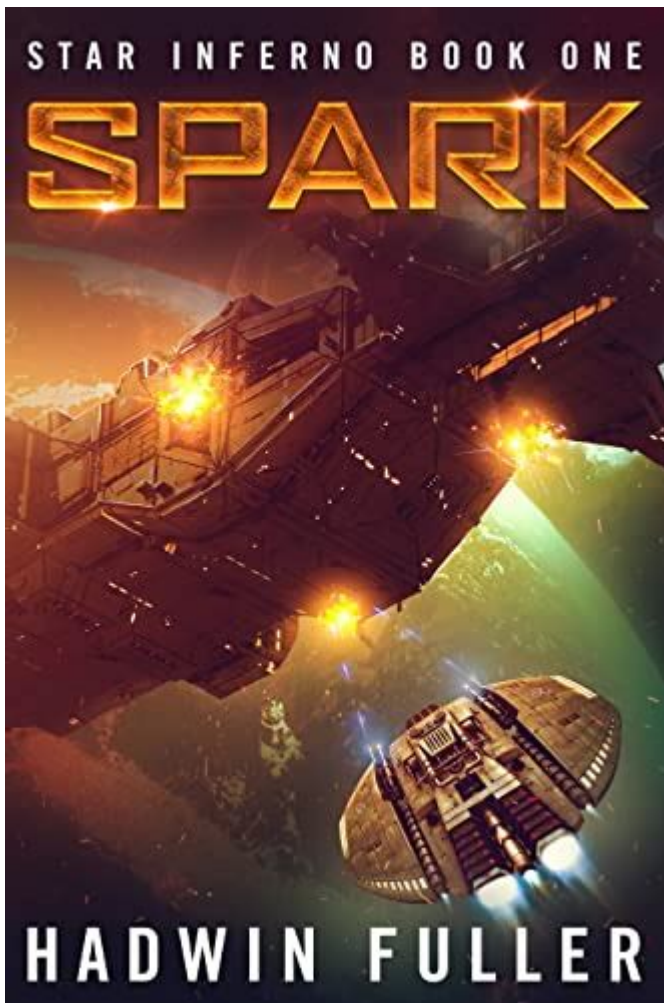

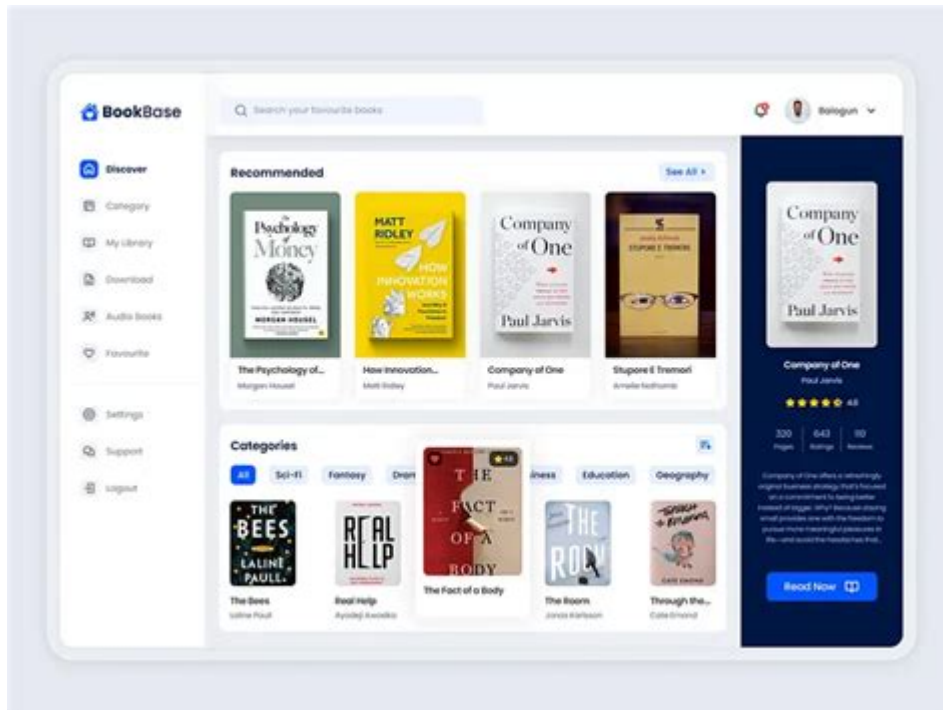


2. Explore Online Communities and Forums

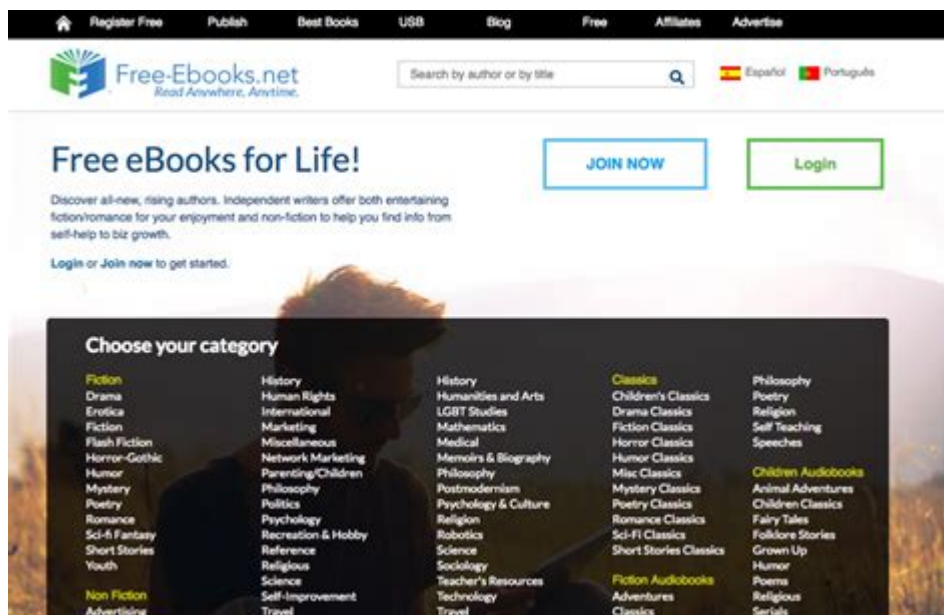


6. Look for Authors Who Cross Boundaries
