LitRPG / GameLit

Hallmarks: Blends literary narrative with role-playing game (RPG) elements. Characters often exist within a game world (virtual reality or an actual magical system that functions like an RPG), complete with stats, levels, quests, and skill progression. Appeals to gamers and those who enjoy system-driven power fantasies.

Young Adult Fantasy (YA Fantasy)

Hallmarks: Specifically targets a teenage audience, often featuring coming-of-age themes, protagonists navigating complex magical worlds while dealing with adolescent challenges. Pacing is typically faster, and themes often explore identity, first love, and rebellion.


Now that you have a map, let's look at how to use it:
