Exaggeration takes a relatable human trait and amplifies it to a point of absurdity, creating a heightened reality where humor thrives.

## **Consistency is Key to Lasting Laughs**

This consistency builds trust with the audience; they know what to expect from the character, which makes deviations or amplified reactions even more impactful.

## **Give Them a Unique Voice and Perspective**

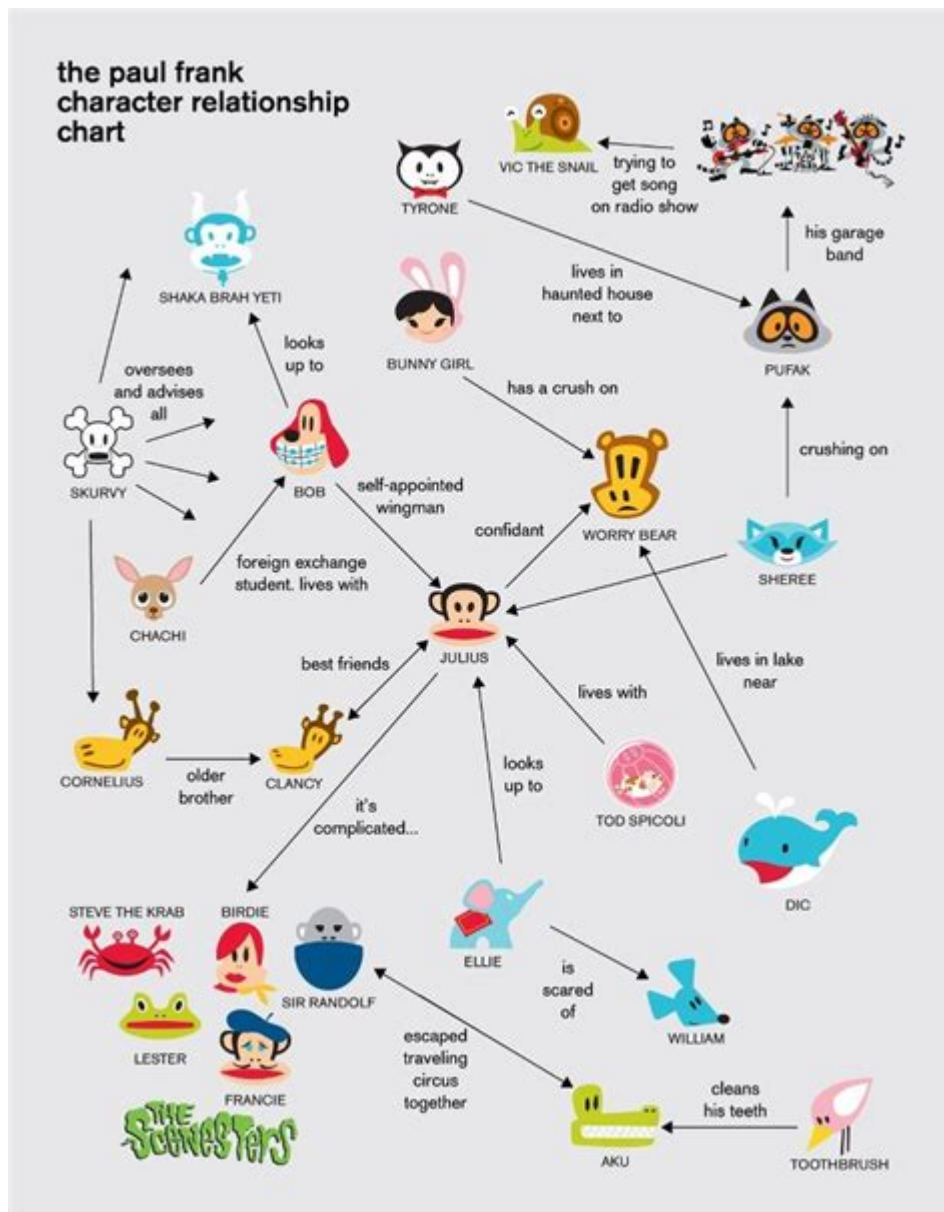

memorable. A character's voice also extends to their mannerisms, habits, and even their physicality. These elements, when consistent, create a rich and believable comedic persona.



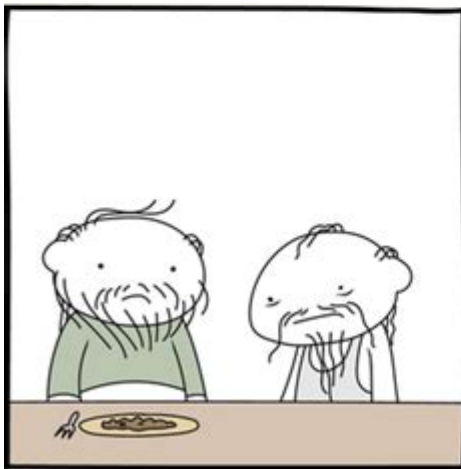
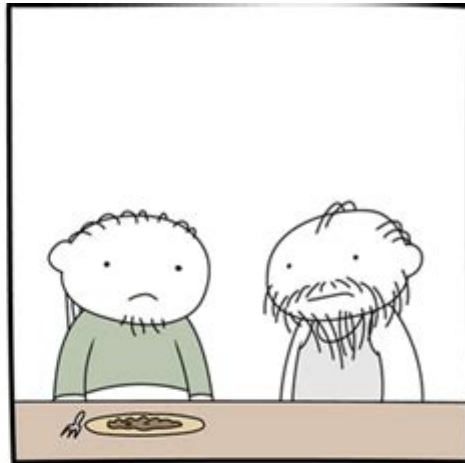
## The Power of Dynamic Relationships
