Goodreads and The StoryGraph

These platforms are invaluable. While Goodreads allows you to add custom tags and filter by specific tropes (often user-generated), The StoryGraph truly shines with its robust filtering system. Reddit and Facebook Groups



Smart Searching and Keyword Strategy
