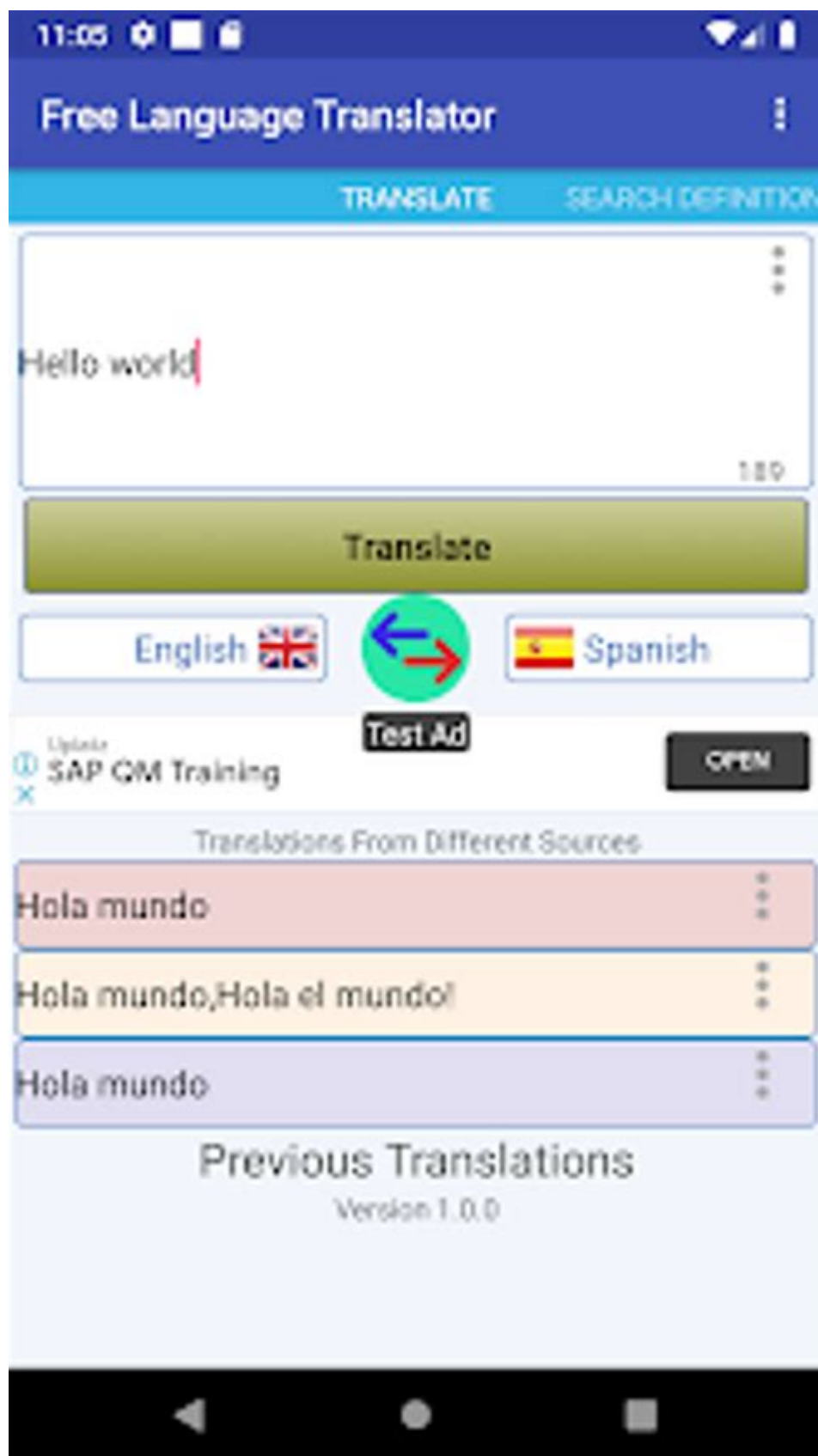
Exploring Niche Platforms and Forums

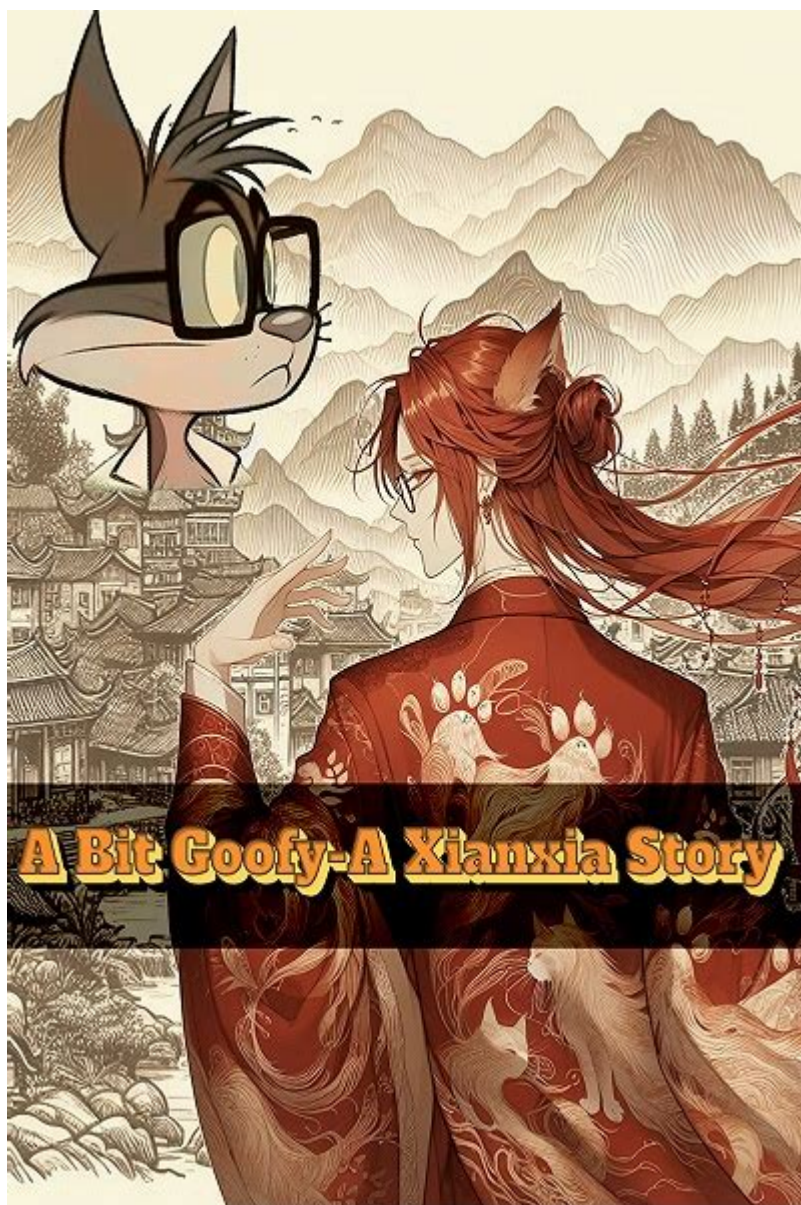
