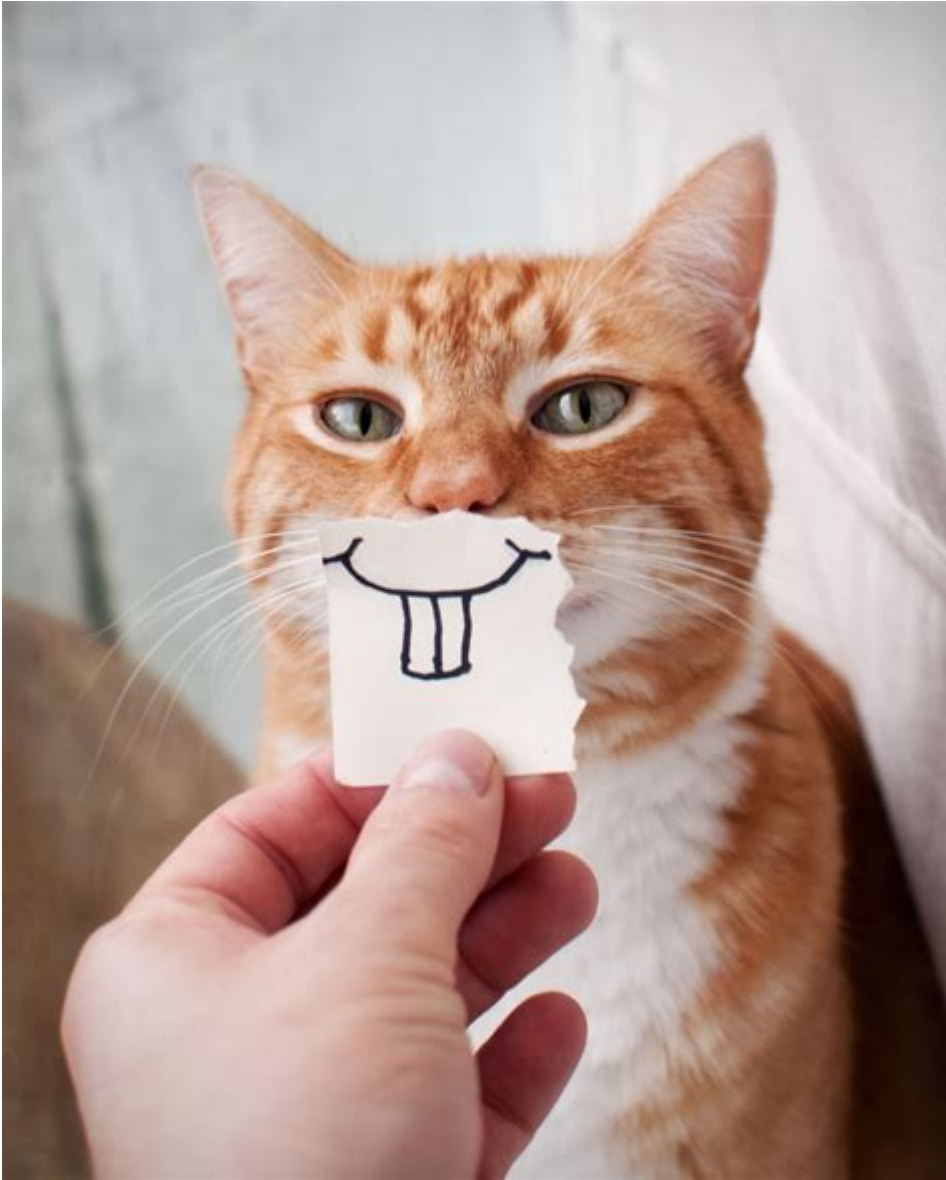

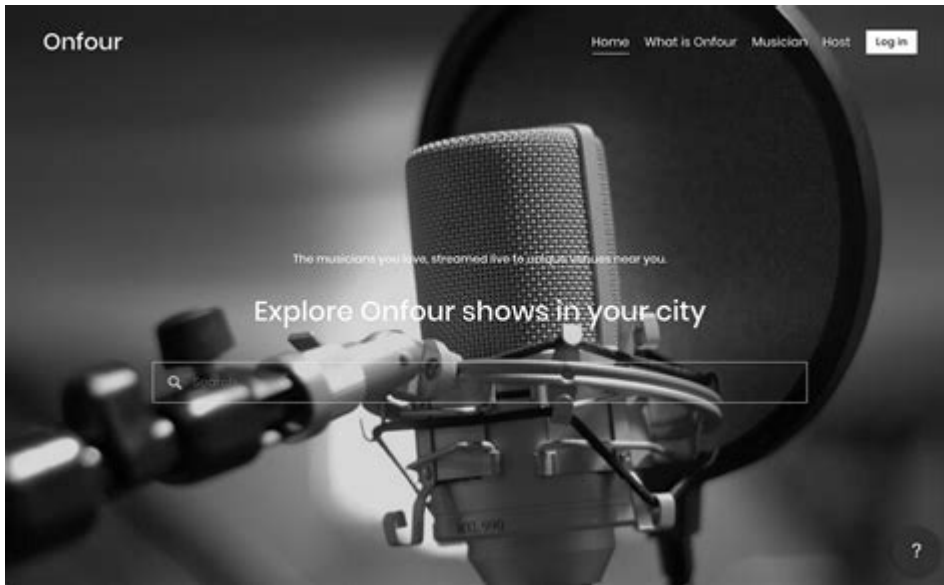

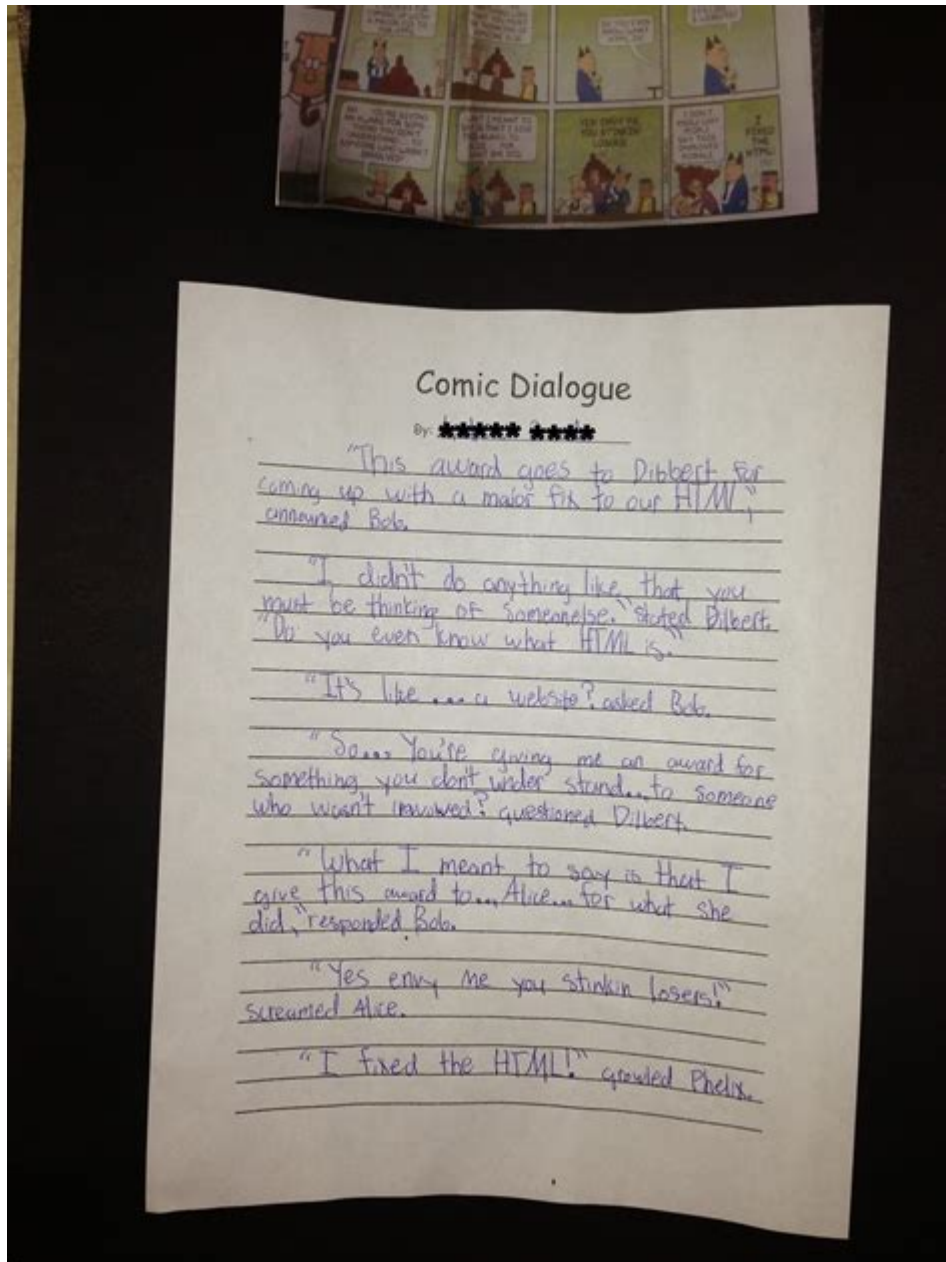
Situational Irony and Absurdity: Twisting Expectations
