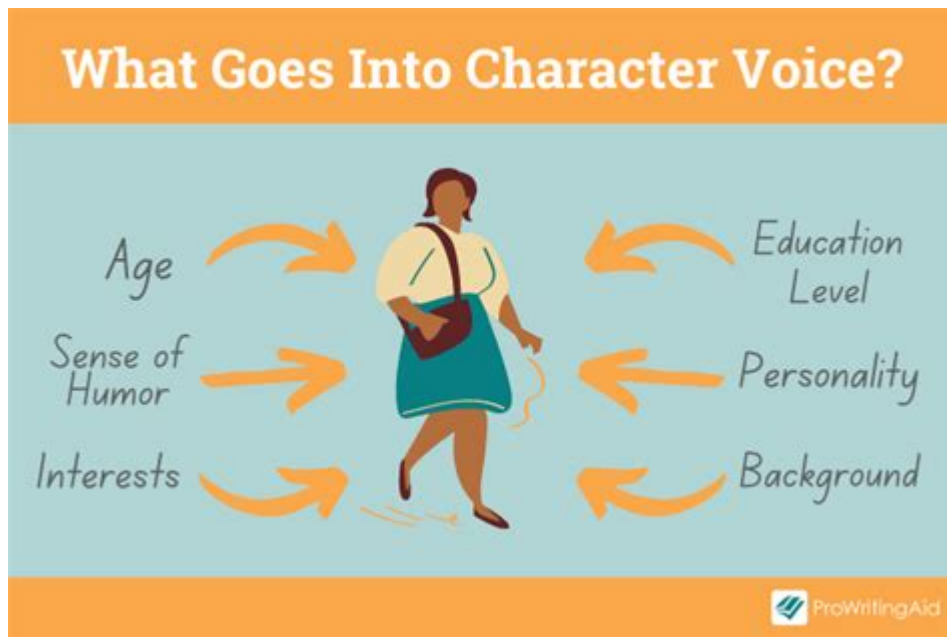

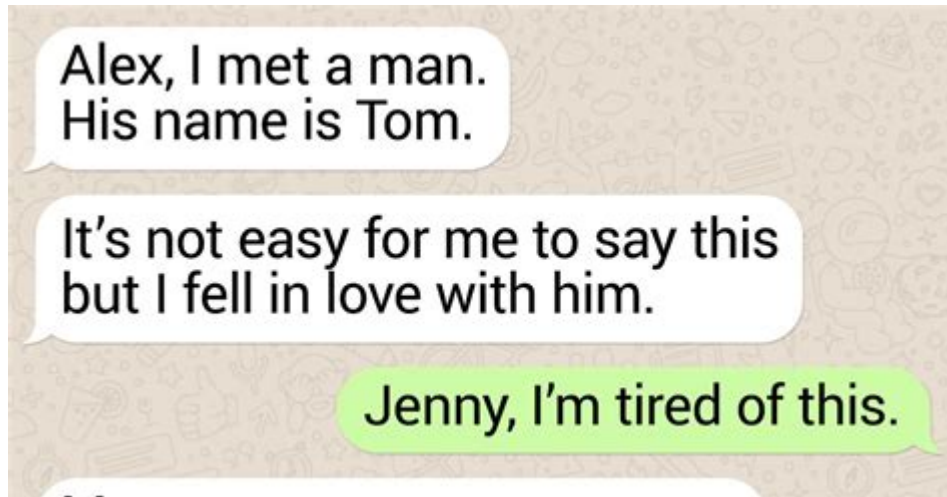


## **Character-Specific Quirks and Running Gags**
