

6. Avoid info dumps

Characters don't need to share information both already know. Tell something new.

7. Cut filler intros and outros

Spare your reader 'I'm fine thanks, and you?' and other pleasantries.

8. Use silences with speech

What could a pause, a hesitation, a trailing off suggest about a character's feelings?

Reveal character insights

What does a person's speech tell us about their age, background or culture?

10. Use action and gesture

What do characters do while talking? What does this add?


