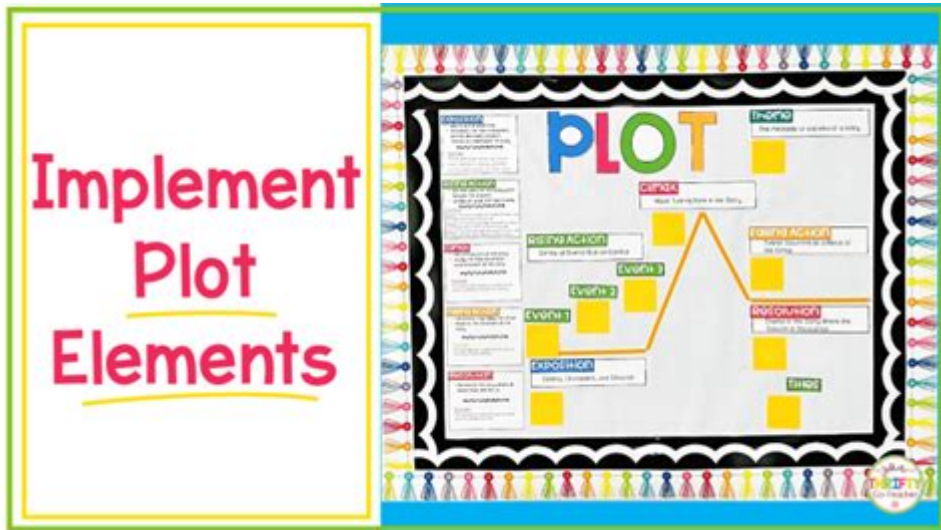
## Layered Misdirection and Thematic Resonance
