




- Consistency in Genre: Authors who stick to a genre tend to hone their craft within it.

- **Poor Formatting:** Inconsistent spacing, odd fonts, or strange chapter breaks in the sample.
- Lack of Historical Detail: If the setting could be any time period, it's likely not strong historical fiction.
