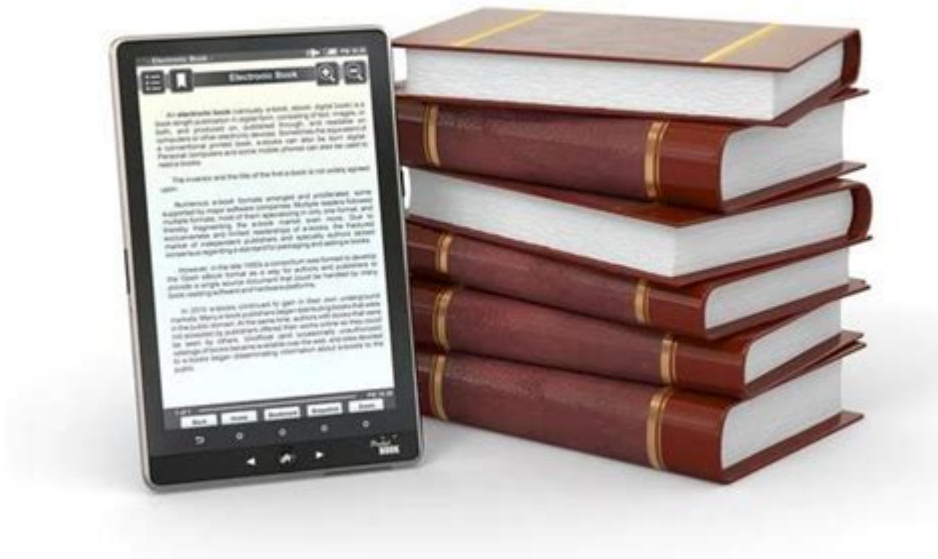


Leveraging Free Resources Wisely
